## **Reclaiming Sabbath**

The Ten Commandments, among other things, prescribe the idea of taking one day to cease from our daily routines for a time of rest and reflection. This concept, biblical law declares, is deeply rooted in the action of God, who created the world in six days and then rested on the seventh. We are given seven days—one week by our reckoning—and there are six days to engage in the activities that provide the necessities of life and one day to stop and reflect.

Jesus declared: "The sabbath was made for humankind, and not humankind for the sabbath; so the Son of Man is lord even of the sabbath" (Mark 2:27-28). I take this to mean that there is no universal sabbath rule book to which I must comply. Rather, there is gifted to me one day to use in a manner that causes me to cease the busyness that defines me the other six days, and thus leads to rest and rejuvenation, whether that is physically, emotionally, spiritually, or relationally.


Human nature tends to reduce this gifted day to a series of legislated dos and don'ts and arguments over which day is the right one. Or, on the other hand, the sabbath becomes a free-for-all day used to meet our desires with little regard for its original intent. As cultures in which we live gradually rolled back laws governing what activities could be done on the sabbath, the principle of sabbath has become diluted. It's hardly recognizable as a special day.

Jesus set his followers free from rigid sabbatarian rules—which is good. Our world has removed any sense of holiness from the sabbath—which is not so good. Might we be a people wise enough to follow the principle of sabbath, avoiding the heavy yoke of legalism while maintaining the intended purpose of the day.

#### SCRIPTURE READING 1 Corinthians 1:18-25
