Hosanna in the Highest Heaven

When I was in high school, my best friends were twins. People who did not know them had trouble telling them apart, but one liked running and the other music. One was extroverted and liked to be outside; the other liked staying at home reading a book.

The words "Hallelujah" and "Hosanna" appear to be similar. "Hallelujah" means to praise, with the Hebrew root words adding a nuance of doing so wildly and with complete abandon. Doesn't that sound like Palm Sunday? However, "Hosanna" comes from Hebrew words that mean, in essence, "Please save us." The suffix "na" indicates intense emotion. Save us. Please. Please.

The people at the time of Jesus lived in occupied territory, with limited rights and freedoms. Today we face wars around the globe, gun violence, poverty, natural disasters, as well as our personal challenges and tragedies. You may be ready to praise with reckless abandon. Or you may be longing for change.


Who can help us? What could be more effective than to take our problems to the highest level, the top manager, the Creator of all?

Sometimes words change meaning: "wicked" means "very" in Massachusetts, as in the phrase "wicked good." "Sick" in slang means "great" rather than "ill." We can let "hosanna" keep its acquired meaning of praise. Or we can be eech God to save us now.
